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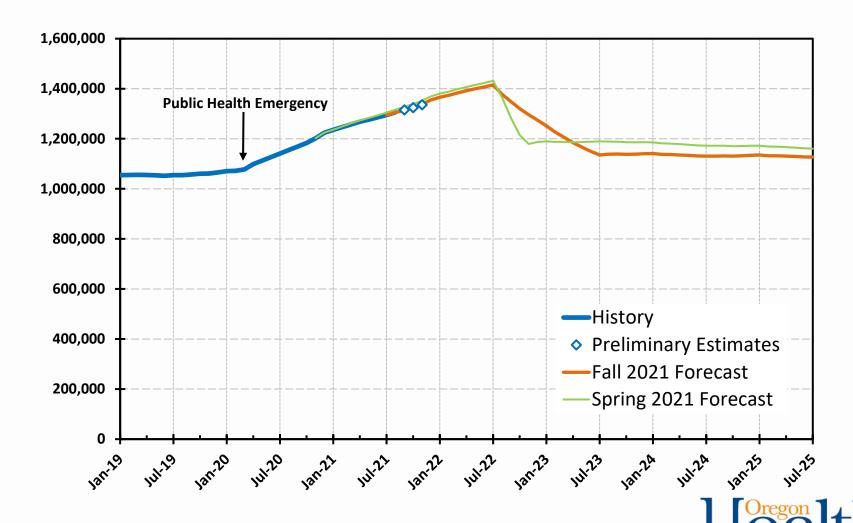

## **OHA Overall Budget Risks**

- ✓ As the COVID-19 pandemic evolves, OHA will need to remain flexible to quickly adjust response efforts to ensure the health and safety for Oregonians.
- ✓ The FEMA reimbursement process is slow and there is a
  risk FEMA will deny some expenditures as not eligible.
- ✓ Increased demands for Oregon State Hospital services and increased acuity for admitted patients.
- ✓ Caseloads are always the major driver of costs in the OHA budget. Small changes can have large impacts on the General Fund need.
