Funds for community college tuition for recent high school/GED graduates

Promise awards can be used at any Oregon community college, for up to 90 college credits

2021-22 Awarding (full-time)

- \$1,000 per year (minimum)
- \$4,131 per year (maximum)
- Before \$50/term co-pay applied



Recent OPG Distribution

OPG Recipients and Student Impacts

- Slightly more likely to be women and Hispanic/Latinx
- 75% of recipients return for 2nd year of the program
- 1st cohort of Promise students appears to have earned their degree somewhat faster than HS graduates did prior to OPG's existence



Financial Impacts

- Program's design capitalizes on federal aid dollars for low-income students (Pell grants)
- OPG award has had a smaller impact as tuition and cost of attendance rise each year

COVID Impacts

- Class of 2021 had significant drop in OPG applications due to many factors
- Class of 2020 had a higher than average EFC cutoff




The OPG Awarding System Distributes Funds After Other Federal and State Aid, Which Results in Fewer Resources for Lower-Income Students

The award amount depends on student's remaining financial need to cover the average cost of tuition.

- If a student's tuition is covered in-full by other public grants, the student receives the minimum award (\$850).
- When combined with the OOG, Promise students from the lowest-income families receive, on average, \$3,628.
- Meanwhile, Promise students from middle and higher-income families receive \$3,981 on average

*All award numbers above are after co-pay, based on 2021-2022 award rates.




More than 50% of recipients are low income, but nearly **80% of the program dollars** go to higher income students.



Inequitable Award Structure – Oregon Promise


2018-19 Oregon Promise Grant Awards

Improving the Impact of the Oregon Promise

Striving to serve the students with the highest need

Oregon Promise helps recent HS and GED® graduates pay their college tuition

A number of barriers prevent the program from advancing equity:

- Low-income students may have personal life stressors and obstacles that affect their high school grades; the <u>current GPA requirement</u> prevents them from advancing their education and future
- 2. The co-pay creates an <u>unnecessary financial burden</u> on already low-income students
- 3. The current minimum award structure puts a cap on how much low-income students receive and <u>disproportionally benefits middle-to-high income</u> students



Improving the Impact of the Oregon Promise

Recommended steps to increasing student access, equity, and success

1 Eliminate the \$50 co-pay

Increase the minimum award and have it rise as tuition increases

Lower the high school GPA requirement from 2.5 to 2.0



Proposed Equity Reforms for OPG

Items 1 & 2 would begin in 2022-23; Item 3 would begin ASAP for Class of 2022 applicants
