### Changes in Mortgage Industry Since 2008

 Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act of 2010

- Secure and Fair Enforcement for Mortgage Licensing Act of 2008 (SAFE Act)
- Mortgage servicer industry reforms



### Federal Foreclosure Protections

### Forbearance plans under the CARES Act

- Federally backed mortgages eligible for COVID hardship forbearance (HUD/FHA, VA, USDA, Fannie Mae, and Freddie Mac loans)
- Forbearance options may be available for private loans; contact your servicer

### Protections for borrowers exiting forbearance

- Deferred payments
- Loan modification
- Loss mitigation requirements

### Homeownership Assistance Fund (HAF) Overview

- U.S. Treasury allocated roughly \$90 million to Oregon under the American Rescue Plan Act's Homeowner Assistance Fund (HAF).
- A homeowner may receive up to \$60,000 in assistance for past due mortgage payments, property taxes, HOA dues and other costs.
- HAF will rollout using a phase-in approach to ensure homeowners most impacted and vulnerable to foreclosure are served first.





### HAF: A Program of Last Resort

- Homeowners may have better, permanent resolution options through their mortgage servicer. US Treasury and Oregon HAF ask that homeowners evaluate all viable workout alternatives first before applying for HAF assistance.
- With the total allocation, Oregon will be able to assist a limited number of homeowners: approx. 15-20% of those in need (~1,200-2,000 homeowners\*).





<sup>\*1,200</sup> estimates assumes each homeowner receives the maximum level of assistance.

### A Phase-in Approach

**Phase 1 (open now)**: Homeowners currently in active foreclosure or the most at-risk of foreclosure or displacement are eligible.

**Phase 2 (coming weeks)**: Homeowners who did not receive a servicer workout option through the Oregon Foreclosure Avoidance (OFA) Program.

Phase 3 (anticipated late March 2022): Homeowners considered socially disadvantaged as defined by U.S. Treasury or within rural communities and/or those impacted by a natural disaster.

**Phase 4 (TBD):** All other eligible applicants can apply, pending funding availability.





### Lessons Learned: COVID Response Programs

- Engaged in <u>Stage Gate</u> process to ensure a quality, secure product from software vendor
- Established a call center and other customer service enhancements
- Phase-in approach to reach the most vulnerable homeowners first

### **OERAP** By the Numbers

- OHCS 3<sup>rd</sup> party processing vendor PPL doubled their output between November (\$21.8M paid) and December (\$46.1M paid)
- ERA1 and ERA2 waves of funding will be fully spent down by the end of March.
- Nearly 34,000 households have been served since program launch in May.
- OHCS remains a top performer nationally.
   As of Monday, Oregon ranks 6<sup>th</sup>.







### Progress Made Since Application Pause







- 23,155 applications paid 5/19/21 12/1/21 (28 weeks)
- 10,615 applications paid 12/1/21 1/12/22 (6 weeks)

### Oregon Reallocation Award from US Treasury

- OHCS will receive ~\$1.16M in additional rental assistance resources, less than 1% requested.
- Only 4 other states and DC have been awarded additional funds.
- There is potential for additional reallocated funds;
   the timeline and amounts are to be determined.





### Implementation of SB 891 (2021)

- As directed by the legislature in SB 891, OHCS is prioritizing applications received before the 12/1/21 pause
- Continuing to implement new notification requirements and program additions within SB 891 currently in effect
- Finishing system and application improvements that we've committed to stakeholders, tenants, and landlords
- Finalizing Eviction Prevention package investments


Total Rental Assistance Paid in 2021

# Overview of Oregon Emergency Rental Assistance Program (OERAP)

- Federal program established in December, \$204 million allocated to OHCS and \$282 million total (direct allocations to Tribal Governments, City of Portland & Lane, Marion, Multnomah, Clackamas & Washington Counties)
- Federal deadline to spend down funds: ERA Wave 1 September 2022, ERA Wave 2 September 2025. OHCS is significantly ahead of those timelines.
- Additional resources from ARPA; \$156 million and approx. \$222.5 million statewide (same jurisdictions)
- Centralized application to increase access (address concerns with 2020 rental assistance programs) and meet robust and rigorous reporting requirements, improve transparency
- The nation is building an emergency rental assistance program for the first time in history.





\$289 M in federal rental assistance resources

+ an additional \$1.16M in reallocated funds
