




Oregon Conservation Corps General Program Overview

OCC Timeline






OCC Implementation Grantmaking Update

Program Design



- Teams of 4-5 members and 1 Crew Supervisor
- 4 Planned Sessions Winter 1, Summer, Fall,
 Winter 2 80 total participants
- Community Assessment Contractor
- Interns
- Partnering Agencies
- Partnering Agencies local Fire, ODF, OSFM, etc.
- 10-12 week long program duration
- Fuels reduction work focused on critical infrastructure and Home ignition zone



Outcomes on the Ground: Session 1 (2 Crews, 9 weeks)



- Site Assessment and prescriptions on properties in Thurston Hills and Cedar Flat
- Removed Fuels Fine, Surface, and Heavy
- Treated property egress for EMS access
- Educated property owners on fire safe property maintenance
- Treated 34 total acres
- 4,066 hours of work accomplished



Workforce Development Outcomes



- 107 hours of education and training for each participant
- AmeriCorps education award
- USDA Chainsaw certification
- NYC Job readiness curriculum
- OSHA Trainings
- CWPC Chipper Feeder, Pole Saw, Brush Cutter and Operator Training (certificate of completion)
- Site Assessment Training (certificate of completion)
- Anaphylaxis Training (certificate of completion)
- Entry level wildland firefighter (NWCG Firefighter 2)
 courses (certificate of completion): IS-100, IS-700, S-130,
 S-190 (Intro to Wildland Fire Behavior), L-180, Field day
 with ODF
