OREGON SOLAR + STORAGE REBATE PROGRAM

HB 2618 (2019) directed ODOE to:

- Provide incentives to support rooftop solar projects statewide
- Include an option to add storage when the solar PV system is installed
- Support low-income service providers and low-to-moderate income households with an elevated rebate rate and a 25% carve out
- Work with solar contractors, who apply for the rebates on behalf of their customers and who market the program in their work





OREGON SOLAR + STORAGE REBATE PROGRAM

State Investments: 2019 - 2022

- HB 2618 (2019) \$2 million
- HB 5006 (2021) \$10 million
- SB 5202 (2022) \$5 million





Results

- 1,855 projects in 29 counties
- Over \$6.2 million in rebates completed or in process
- Supporting over \$69.5 million investment in clean energy
- 60 approved contractors
- 37% to low- to moderate-income





COMMUNITY RENEWABLE ENERGY GRANT PROGRAM

HB 2021 established the Community Renewable Energy Grant Program to:

- Offset costs of planning and developing community renewable energy projects
- Support projects in traditionally underserved communities
- Promote small-scale community renewable energy projects
- Provide direct benefits to communities across Oregon by improving energy resilience, creating local jobs, promoting economic development, and reducing local energy costs.





Applicant Eligibility

- Tribes
- Counties
- Municipalities
- Special government bodies such as ports and irrigation districts
- Consumer-Owned Utilities
- Outside Portland

BUDGET PRIORITIES

- 50 percent or more for grants to be awarded for planning or developing community renewable energy projects that qualify as community energy resilience projects.
- 50 percent or more for grants to be awarded for planning or developing community renewable energy projects that primarily serve **one or more environmental justice communities**.



GRANTS TO OREGON COMMUNITIES

PROJECT CATEGORY	MAXIMUM GRANT AWARD	MAXIMUM % OF COST
Planning, Energy Resilience	\$100,000	100%
Planning, Renewable Energy Only	\$100,000	100%
Construction, Energy Resilience	\$1,000,000	100%
Construction, Renewable Energy Only	\$1,000,000	50%

Grants will be awarded on a competitive basis and will include performance agreements and time limits for completing projects.



Program Timeline



Summer. Implementation planning.

September. Established Advisory Committee.

Fall. Developed draft rules, staff recruitment.



January. Program rules finalized, program manager on board.

January – May. Community outreach.

March 4. Opportunity Announcements posted.



May 23. Application portal open; first round reviews starting July 8.

ENERGY EFFICIENT WILDFIRE REBUILDING INCENTIVE

HB 5006:

SECTION 111. In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the **State Department of Energy**, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$10,831,296, for a grant program to incentivize energy efficient rebuilding after the 2020 wildfires.





INCENTIVES

Residential structure:

• Code: \$3,000

Above code: \$6,000

Residential structure w/low- or moderate-income owner:

• Code: \$7,500

• Above code: \$15,000

Manufactured dwelling:

• New energy efficient manufactured dwelling: \$12,500


Heat pump system installation: up to \$5,000

Commercial, Public, and Multifamily:

Code: \$3,000 (\$4,000 if over 25,000 sq ft)

Above code: \$8,000 (\$10,000 if over 25,000 sq ft)

Additional \$500/unit (max \$18,000) for low-income housing





SUPPORTING SURVIVORS

- Applications opened April 19
- So far:
 - Over 200 Applications Received or In Process
- Next Steps:
 - Reaching out to the organizations supporting survivors, including counties, cities, and disaster case managers
 - Direct engagement with survivors
 - Continuous program evaluation



RURAL & AGRICULTURAL ENERGY AUDIT PROGRAM

Energy audits and assessments help save energy and money, and plan for future capital investments.

- ODOE received a \$100,000 USDA Rural Energy Development Assistance (REDA) Grant
- Grant dollars cover up to 75% of energy audit costs
 - Participants responsible for remaining 25% (may be reimbursable)
- Eligible Participants:
 - Agricultural Producers
 - Rural Small Businesses
