Outcomes: Oregon Emergency Rental Assistance Program (OERAP)

OERAP Spend Down Update

Goal: OHCS committed to spending \$289 million in rental assistance resources by the end of March 2022.

Outcome: On March 7th, OHCS announced more than \$289 million in assistance resources had been allocated to Oregonians in need.

Goal: Spend down the \$100 million in state funds allocated during the December 2021 Special Session by June 30, 2022.

Outcome: OHCS is on track to deploy all state funds by the end of June.



Federal spend-down timeline is September 2022 for ERA1 & September 2025 for ERA 2.

State Requirements:

The state-level ERA funding allocated in December of 2021 must be spent down by June 30, 2023.



OERAP Spend Down Update

Remaining Uncommitted Funds: ~\$30 million

This remaining funding consists of:

- \$17 million in U.S Treasury reallocated funds (\$1.6M + \$16M), and
- \$13.5 million in recaptured community partner funds
- All state funds will be spent by June 2022.


Remaining Funds Spend Down Plan:

- OHCS has open the recertification process to OERAP applicants who received 11 months or fewer of rental assistance, but still need support
 - Approx. 6,000 households have either initiated or submitted their recertifications thus far, with an average request of ~\$3,200 per household

Eviction Prevention: Funding Deployment

Includes \$100 million in funding from the December Special Session & \$30 million in Homelessness Prevention/Eviction Prevention funding from 2022 Short Session.

Case Management

100% of case management specific funds have been deployed.

Rental Assistance

84.6% of funds are deployed, with clear plans for all remaining funds by August 2022.

Mediation Services

All mediation services funds will be deployed by July 2022.



Legal Services

81.8% of funds are deployed, with clear plans for all remaining funds to be deployed by July 2022.

4 PILLARS OF HOUSING RETENTION

The four pillars of housing retention, centering equity and racial justice, are cited as best practices in eviction prevention. Flexible funding allows each household to access support through a trusted local provider.



Regional Allocation: ORE-DAP

As a critical element of the Eviction Prevention funding allocated in the Dec. 2021 Special Session, OHCS has distributed

\$46.5 million

across the Community Action Agency Network, to be distributed in partnership with culturally-specific organizations, to support Oregonians with local rental assistance and other services.

\$1.25 million

in community dispute resolution centers (CDRCs) to launch mediation pilots to help Oregonians avoid evictions and seek satisfactory resolutions to cases between landlords and tenants.

Since the summer of 2021, Oregon Law Center's Eviction Defense Project has assisted over 1,000 households in eviction court matters.

All pilot program funds will be deployed by June 2022.






Homeless Services Funding Deployment





Regional Allocation: Project Turnkey Operations Funding (Round 2)

OHCS will also invest an additional

\$2.5 million

to support the growth and operational costs of Project Turnkey Round 2 sites.


Round 2 of Project Turnkey was funded in March 2022 through the Oregon Community Foundation. Sites have not yet been selected but will aim to add an additional 500 emergency shelter units across the state. OHCS is anticipating splitting operational support funds across what will likely be 10 sites.

Oregon's housing crisis is supply driven. The answer is not simply more homes, but homes that are affordable in a wide range of price points, across income levels, in every city and region of the state.



>580,000 new homes

- \$442.9 million develop new rental housing
- \$100 million preserve affordable housing
- \$30 million land and property acquisition
- \$20 million new starter home development program
- \$10 million co-locate affordable housing and childcare/early learning
- \$5 million construction cost increases

- \$65 million preserve affordable housing
- \$50 million construction cost increases
- \$30 million develop new rental housing
- \$20 million funds for homeownership unit development
- \$20 million acquire and preserve manufactured home parks
- \$10 million land acquisition

Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH)

- 895 new PSH homes have been developed out of OHCS' goal to build 1,000 new homes by the end of 2023.
- \$50 million* in state bonds will be deployed to develop PSH this biennium
