Measure 110

Class E Violations Through 8/31/2022

Key Points

- Filed in 33 circuit courts
- 3169 cases with Class E violations
- 88 cases for offenses before 2/1/21
- 3081 cases for offenses on or after the 2/1/21 effective date
 - 2504 with convictions (81%). Of those, 1716 failed to appear.
 - 245 with all Class E violation charges dismissed (8%)
 - o 332 pending (11%)
 - o 23 juvenile cases
- 299 people have multiple cases with Class E violations.
- Most Class E violations are for possession of methamphetamine (66%) or heroin (17%).
- 201 (7%) were issued to non-Oregon residents from 21 states.

Measure 110



2021 Senate Bill 755-C codified and amended Ballot Measure 110, which decriminalized most unlawful possession of a controlled substance (PCS) offenses.

Reduction of Penalties

Measure 110 reduced the penalties for most PCS offenses from a felony or misdemeanor to a new Class E violation, punishable with a \$100 maximum fine. Effective February 1, 2021, most PCS offenses are punishable only by a fine – no jail, supervision, or other criminal penalties can be imposed.

History

Measure 110 was approved by Oregon voters in the November 2020 election and reduced penalties for most PCS offenses as of February 1, 2021. The legislature passed SB 755-C, which took effect on July 19, 2021. Major court-related changes in SB 755-C include:

- Allowing a person charged with a Class E violation to obtain a treatment needs screening or treatment contact within 45 days of the citation, provide proof to the court, and have their case dismissed.
- Requiring law enforcement to provide information on how to obtain a screening when issuing a citation for a Class E violation.
- Establishing a \$45 minimum fine.
- Requiring all Class E violations to be filed in circuit courts.
- Prohibiting penalties for failing to appear in court for a Class E violation.


Class E Violations in Oregon's Circuit Courts


For Offenses between 2/1/21 and 8/31/22

Data on demographic characteristics of people cited for Class E violations, the substance involved, and charges in addition to the Class E violation come from the law enforcement citation or district attorney charging document and are transferred into the official court record.

This information is provided by court case, from cases filed in circuit courts. A single court case can involve one or more Class E violations, or Class E violations and other charges. If a person receives two separate citations for a Class E violation, they are counted as separate cases.
