

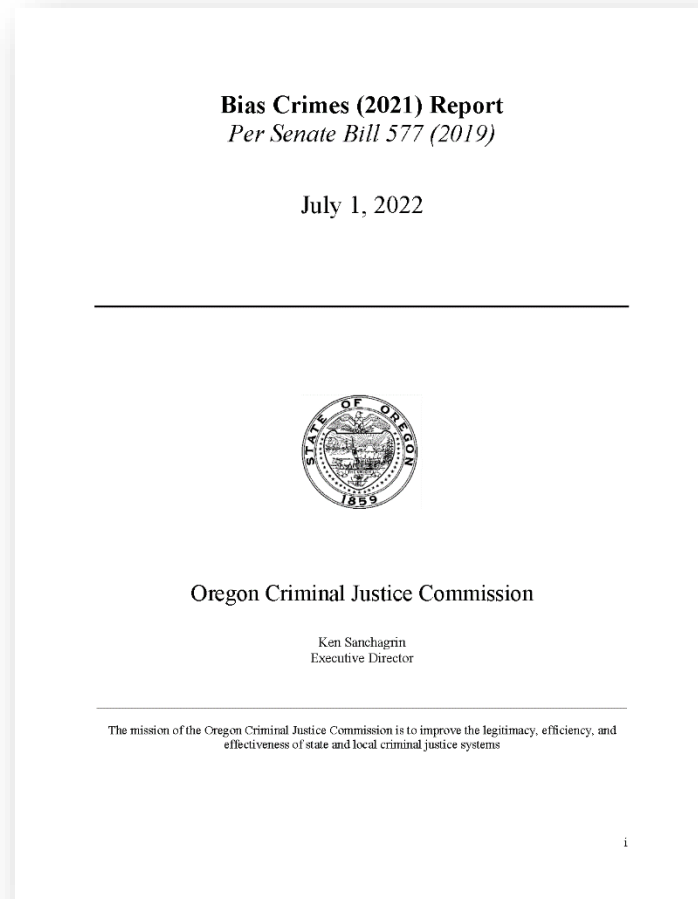

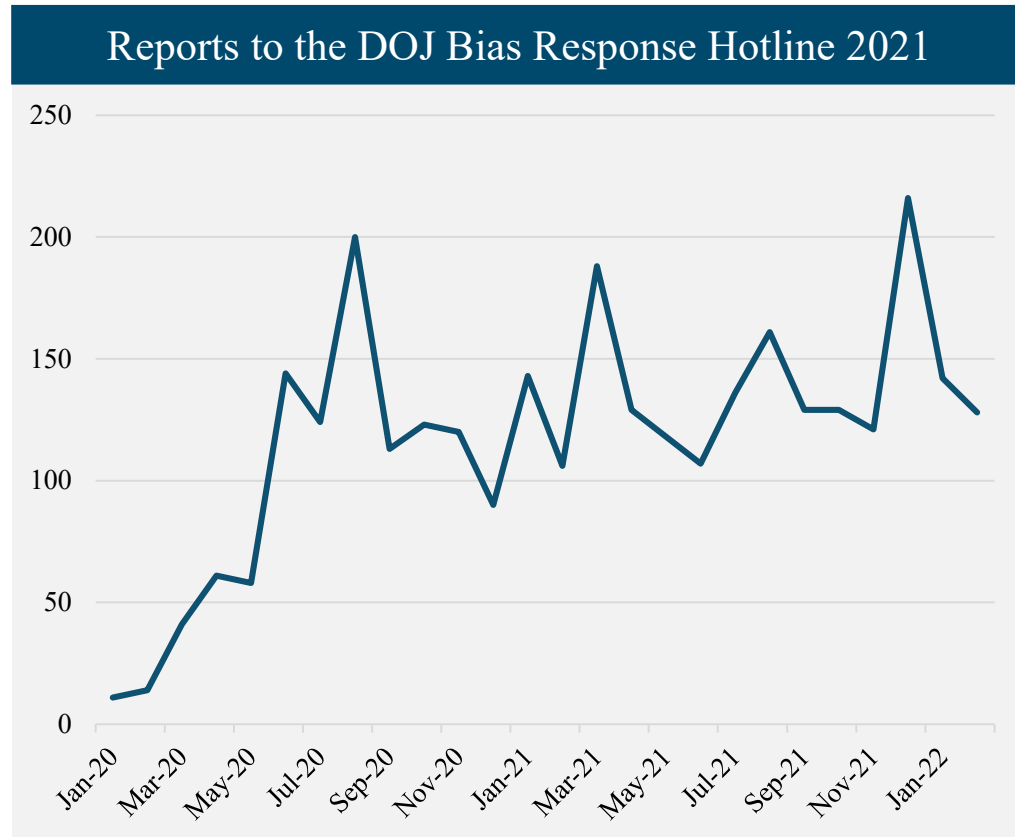
GENERAL TAKEAWAYS



- In July 2022, the CJC and DOJ partnered to release the third annual Bias Crimes Report, as required by SB 577 (2019).
- The report provides data and analysis on bias crime and incident data in Oregon.

 - Arrest Data
 - Prosecution Data

GENERAL TAKEAWAYS: BIAS RESPONSE HOTLINE REPORTS



- The DOJ Bias Response Hotline receives reports of both bias crimes and bias incidents.
- Year over year, the DOJ Bias Response Hotline saw a 53% increase in reports in the 2021 data reporting year.
 - Increased reports against all targeted protected classes for both bias incidents and bias crimes.
 - Drastic increases in anti-Asian bias reported crimes (+300%) and incidents (+156%).
 - In our past two reports, the highest volume of incidents and crimes were for anti-Black.

GENERAL TAKEAWAYS: BIAS RESPONSE HOTLINE REPORTS

- The BRH collects information concerning the bias incident or crime from callers.
- For both bias incidents and bias crimes, race was the most common motivating factor (many incidents involved multiple protected classes).
 - For bias incidents, Black/African American, Asian, AI/AN and NH/OPI individuals generally targeted because of their race
 - For bias incidents, Hispanic individuals generally targeted due to color, national origin, and disability
 - For bias incidents, White individuals targeted due to sexual orientation, religion, and disability
 - For bias crimes, Black/African American, Asian, Hispanic, and NH/OPI individuals generally targeted because of their race
 - For bias crimes, White individuals generally targeted due to anti-sexual orientation, gender identity, and religious/anti-Semitic bias

- CJC also examines bias crimes reported to the police via NIBRS.
- Overall, while reports to the BRH increased, reports of bias crimes to law enforcement decreased by 15% in 2021.
- Comparing the BRH bias crime reports to NIBRS shows some interesting patterns:
 - BIPOC reports to law enforcement lag behind reports to the BRH significantly.
 - White individuals appear more comfortable reporting bias crimes to law enforcement.
