

Agency Transition Timeline

- House Bill 2927 Passed
- Project Manager hired through a job rotation
- Met with partner agencies for transition models
- Developed key position framework
- Finalized transition model

- Special Purpose Appropriation funding requested and received
- Securing General Headquarters and satellite locations
- Secured staff overflow space and storage facility
- Hired key leadership positions
- Implement transition model
- Began website transition

- Finalize business services transition
- Finalize contract for General Headquarters and satellite location
- Move into General Headquarters by May 1st
- July 1st, OSFM becomes an independent state agency.

- Procurement
 - All positions hired
- Budget development
 - Chief Financial Officer is hired
 - Submitted a budget at Current Service Level
 - Finance transition workgroup is well underway



BY THE NUMBERS SIGNIFICANT & COSTLY WILDFIRES

THE FOUR MOST SIGNIFICANT AND COSTLY FIRES IN 2022:

- RUM CREEK: \$5.8 MILLION
- DOUBLE CREEK & STURGILL: \$2.5 MILLION
- CEDAR CREEK: \$1.4 MILLION
- MILLER ROAD: \$3.1 MILLION



2022 Wildfire Season Successes

IMMEDIATE RESPONSE & PRE-POSITION ASSIGNMENTS

In 2022, the Oregon Office of State Fire Marshal mobilized resources to five pre-positioning assignment. Resources were also mobilized through Immediate Response on 11 incidents across Oregon.

- Three of the five task forces that were prepositioned were assigned and responded to an active incident.
- 45 engines were mobilized through Immediate Response.
