Community Action Agencies

- MWVCAA not a typical Community Action Agency, heavy into direct homeless services, emergency services, last three years a "Mini-FEMA."
- Provided more than \$30,000,000 in rental assistance to more than 5,000 Marion-Polk households since 2020; provided \$4 million wildfire assistance since 2020.
- Major regional shelter operator:
 - ARCHES Inn: 80-Room Project Turnkey hotel
 - Tanner Project: 36-bed Veterans Facility
 - Taylor's House: 10 bed RHY Youth Facility
 - Youth Drop-In: Youth Day Center in Salem
 - City of Salem Navigation Center: 75-Bed Facility
 - ARCHES Project Day Center: 150 Unique visitors each day
 - Looking for a Second Motel, Second Youth Shelter in Polk
 - All the Emergency Warming for Salem

The Navigation Center




- Staffed 24/7/365

- 75 Shelter Beds, based on a cohort model centered on street homeless clients.
- Transition center into longerterm shelters, and permanent housing.
- Pets, Partners, and a wet facility.
- Full Commercial Kitchen.
- Opens in February.








Conclusions

Statewide homeless populations have increased, and will continue to grow considerably in 2023.

Currently funded work desperately needs to be continued, or it will cause additional homelessness and death.

New funding streams need to be developed to meet prevention, targeted homeless population needs, and more unsheltered services in Oregon.

Alignment between Department of Human Services, OHCS, and OHA is critical.

Many demands on the Legislature for direct funding to cities in particular, we support that work but it cannot be a "no strings attached" model, and needs to focus on the concentration of need.

Models of coercion and internment are doomed to fail, and will set back our progress a generation.
