- 4) 4) Recently, the U.S. Department of Labor Employment and Training Administration (ETA) offered federal grant opportunities regarding military licensure accreditation. The grant opportunity was titled, "Veterans Accelerated Learning for Licensed Occupations", otherwise known as VALLO. The federal Grant intent was to expedite attainment of state occupational licenses for Transitioning Service Members and veterans. The project aimed to accomplish this by identifying gaps between military education and training in specific military occupations as compared to the education required for related licensed civilian occupations. Examples of types of occupations used as focal point included Healthcare, Protective Services, Skilled Trades, Transportation, Education and Business. Although these 2 programs focused on veterans, they may be mirrored for military spouse credentialling and gives examples of types priority military occupations:
