#### Public Hearing

HB 3274

(1:05 - 1:25 pm) Directs Department of Corrections to develop strengths-based release planning assessment.

HB 3374

(1:25 - 1:50 pm) Provides that when court reduces felony conviction to Class A misdemeanor after person's completion of probation, person for purposes of law is deemed not to have been previously convicted of felony.

### **Work Session**

HB 2002

Converts mandatory minimum sentences for specified felonies other than murder to presumptive sentences.

HB 2003

Expands membership of Public Defense Services Commission from seven to nine members.

HB 2169

Directs Racial Justice Council to study potential changes to criminal justice system and to provide results of study to Legislative Assembly no later than December 31, 2021.

HB 2482

Removes entering or remaining unlawfully in or on public transit vehicle or public transit station as manner of committing crime of interfering with public transportation.

HB 3182

Directs Department of Human Services to study and make recommendations on provisions of state law relating to adoption of Indian children.

HB 3230 \*\*

\*\*Subsequent Referral(s) to Ways and Means

Establishes universal representation program in Oregon Department of Administrative Services.

### Recommended from the House Judiciary Subcommittee on Civil Law:

HB 2523

Directs Department of Transportation to waive driving privilege reinstatement fee if driving privileges were suspended for failing to pay fine.

HB 3176

Permits chief administrative law judge to require implied consent hearing to be conducted by telephone or other two-way communication device if judge determines that meeting in person poses significant risk to health or safety.

## Recommended from the House Judiciary Subcommittee on Equitable Policing:

HB 2575

Directs Department of Justice to establish program for awarding grants to law enforcement agencies and local governments for training of groups and agencies that interact with persons who have experienced trauma.

HB 3164

Modifies crime of interfering with a peace officer or parole and probation officer.

Note change: Public hearings removed for HB 3186 and HB 3216. Timing adjusted. HB 3176 moved under Civil Law subcommittee heading. Work session on HB 2399 removed.
