Public Hearing

SB 190 A

(3:15 - 3:35 pm) Modifies permissible methods of providing notice of appointment of guardian to protected person.

SB 578 A

(3:35 - 4:00 pm) Requires court, under certain circumstances, to appoint legal counsel for respondent or protected person in protective proceeding.

SB 572

(4:00 - 4:35 pm) Modifies protective proceedings to permit vulnerable youth guardianships for adults between 18 and 21 years of age who are eligible for special immigrant status and who are unable to be reunified with parent due to abuse, neglect or abandonment that occurred before adult attained 18 years of age.

Work Session

SB 185 A

Specifies circumstances under which members of nonprofit corporation and board of directors of nonprofit corporation may discuss issues or take action by electronic means without meeting.

SB 220

Prescribes formalities for remote attestation of writing.

SB 221

Modifies court procedure for determining whether decedent intended writing to be decedent's will, partial or complete revocation of decedent's will or addition to or alteration of decedent's will.

SB 728

Modifies provisions of law relating to administration of decedents' estates.

SB 765

Makes permanent provisions allowing notary public to perform notarial act using communication technology for remotely located individual under certain circumstances.

SB 767

Allows signature of judgment creditor or attorney signing satisfaction document to be notarized or accompanied by declaration under penalty of perjury.

Neither registration nor use of the public access kiosk is a guarantee that you will be able to testify during the meeting. Committee chairs may determine that public testimony must be limited. For this reason, written testimony is encouraged even if you plan to speak.

Unless otherwise noted on the agenda, testimony is only accepted by committees for bills or topics scheduled for a public hearing. See the Oregon Legislature's website for information on contacting individual legislators directly on bills or topics not scheduled for a public hearing.
