

Framework: Improving Behavioral Health






Behavioral Health Defined

- Behavioral Health conditions include:
 - Mental illness includes a wide range of conditions that affect mood, thinking and behavior such as: depression, anxiety disorders, schizophrenia, and eating disorders.
 - Addictions include excessive use of alcohol or other drugs and gambling disorders.
 - Neurodevelopmental Disorders include intellectual and developmental disabilities
 - <u>Co-occurring Conditions</u> include the combination of two or more of the following: mental illness, addiction, problem gambling or an intellectual or developmental disability



Coronavirus Relief Fund Status & Overview

The legislature allocated \$25 million in CARES funds in June to support culturally responsive and barrier-reducing behavioral health activities to mitigate the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic.

- Funding Includes:
 - Culturally specific services through Counties, Tribes, and CBOs
 - Community Residential
 Capacity/Infection Control
 - Additional \$5.1 million GF at January Emergency Board.



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Suicide Prevention, Intervention and Postvention (SPIP) Team

- In March 2020, OHA formed a COVID-19 Suicide Prevention, Intervention and Postvention (SPIP) team to monitor data, improve access to care, equip providers, and seek consumer voice.
- The SPIP team is closely monitoring suicide activity specifically during the COVID-19 pandemic and continues to meet weekly to analyze data, implement interventions, resource other state partners, and report on innovative practices from other states.
- SPIP is lifespan suicide prevention team continues to address identified needs, barriers, and to elevate protective factors.
- Engaging with behavioral health consumers and other partners to identify barriers and address needs as they arise.

Measure 110 Implementation

- Requires OHA to administer and support all aspects of implementing the Act.
- Temporary 24/7 Telephone Addiction Recovery Center by Feb. 1, 2021.
- Form Oversight and Accountability Council by Feb 1, 2021.
- 24/7 Addiction Recovery Centers (ARCs) throughout the state by Oct. 1, 2021.
- Grants program to pay for ARC treatment and recovery services.
