

Recycling in Oregon

- Opportunity to Recycle Act passed in 1983
- Reduced greenhouse gas emissions by 3.3 million metric tons of CO₂ equivalents (2018)
- Recovery goal: 52% by 2020

• Current recovery rate: 41% (2018)





Recycling system issues

- Public confusion
- Increased contamination
- Higher costs passed on to ratepayers
- Lack of access to recycling, especially in apartments and rural areas
- No assurance of responsible recycling
- Insufficient involvement from brands and manufacturers





Recycling Steering Committee

Purpose:

- Optimize the environmental benefits of managing materials using a life cycle perspective.
- Create a resilient recovery system that can adapt to changes in supply and demand.
- Restore and maintain public trust in the system.





HB 2065 – Modernizing Oregon Recycling





Benefits of shared responsibility



- Expand recycling programs
- Make the system easier to use
- Prevent litter
- Reduce waste in the first place
- Advance equity
- Ensure responsible recycling



Producers as partners



- Protect ratepayers from increased costs
- Control and influence product design and labeling
- Drive demand for recycled content
- Maintain level playing field for in-state businesses
- Involved in discussions about HB 2065



Extended producer responsibility

Environmental management strategy for minimizing a product's environmental, health, safety and social impacts throughout all stages of the product's life.









Components of EPR programs

- Statutory requirements, such as:
 - Establish convenient system
 - Ensure environmentally sound management
 - Fund program
 - Report annually

- Producer responsibility organization(s)
- Program plans
- Agency oversight



Oregon E-Cycles

- Covered products: Computers, monitors, TVs, printers, keyboards, mice
- Stewardship organizations:
 - 1. State Contractor Program (National Center for Electronics Recycling)
 - 2. Manufacturers Recycling Management (MRM)
- Year established: 2007
- Collected over 268 million pounds of electronic devices (since 2009)





Paint

- Covered products: Architectural paint and other coatings
- Year established: 2009
- Stewardship organization: PaintCare
- Collected over 6.1 million gallons of leftover paint (2010-2019)





Drug Take-Back

- Year established: 2019
- Covered products: Prescription and nonprescription drugs, drugs marketed under a brand or generic names, combination products
- Program plan review in progress
- Implementation scheduled to begin in July 2021





Bottle Bill

• Covered products:

- Water, carbonated beverages, beer and malt beverages, kombucha and hard seltzer – 3 liters or less
- Other non-alcoholic beverages (like tea, coffee, juice), other alcoholic beverages (like hard cider), marijuana and hemp beverages 4 oz to 1.5 liters
- Year established: 1971
- Stewardship organization: Oregon Beverage Recycling Cooperative (OBRC)
- Over 80% redemption rate
