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OEDD Mission Statement:

The mission of the Oregon Economic Development Districts is to "provide a cohesive network for effective, efficient delivery of economic development services benefiting healthy and sustainable communities and businesses."

OEDD supports the statewide network of Economic Development Districts in their efforts to serve this function.



Oregon's ED Districts

- Established by the federal Economic Development Administration (Dept. of Commerce)
- Border-to-border coverage of Oregon and a national network
- Some organized under COGs, others are 501(c)(3)s and other ORS 190 entities
- 11 regional EDDs and the Associated Tribes of Northwest Indians (ATNI)



The District network is diverse in geography, staff size, and specific functions, but we all perform the following:

Regional Prioritization and Planning

- Comprehensive Economic Development Strategies (CEDS)
 - Prepared with our regional partners collaborative plans
 - Identify the key economic development needs and strategies for the region and our constituent communities (e.g. business development, infrastructure, workforce, etc.
 - Help our partners coalesce around strategies and promote readiness for investment
 - CEDS are used by state and federal agencies, foundations, etc. to ID the priority needs of a region.

Some Key Strategies for the SCOEDD Region Include:

- Plan for, maintain and re-invest in infrastructure, including attainable housing, to provide for current population demands and support future economic development opportunities.
- Develop/improve infrastructure for visitors to experience outdoor recreation and nature-based tourism.
- Support existing business and expand business formation in the region by focusing on entrepreneurial-led development strategies.
- Improve curb appeal of main streets and city centers so as to revitalize downtowns.



Regional Prioritization and Planning, cont.

- 2021: All Districts will be preparing COVID-19 Economic Recovery Plans
 - We are close to finalizing a coordinated approach to these Plans, in order to support a statewide look at needs and opportunities
 - Goal is to support state and federal agencies, legislators, foundations, etc. in identifying key needs and strategies for policy making, program development, investment decisions, etc.
- Always: We represent our respective regions' needs to state and federal agencies, policymakers, Oregon federal delegation, etc.



Regional Capacity/Service Delivery

- Districts are often tapped to provide needed services at a regional scale
 - Recent example: 2020 COVID-19 Small Business and Non-Profit Grant Programs.
 Worked with our regional partners to design and deliver several rounds of grant programs
 - Built networks and managed outreach
 - Provided tons of assistance to businesses to help them submit
 - Evaluated applications
 - Fiscal administration; cut checks
 - Took the heat!



Regional Capacity/Service Delivery

- Examples:
 - COIC conducted 7 rounds of grants in 2020 pooling local, foundation, and state/federal funding to the tune of nearly \$6 million for Central Oregon.
 - South Central Oregon Economic Development District (SCOEDD) with the help of Business Oregon and the Klamath Small Business Development Center has awarded over \$3.38 million (\$3,380,218.58) in CARES Act grant funding to over four-hundred (412) small businesses in Klamath and Lake Counties.



Districts: Other Functions

Many of the Districts also provide the following functions....

Capital Access

- Most Districts manage Revolving Loan Fund programs developed with federal and other resources – EDA RLF, USDA IRP, foundation and local funds
 - Note: often have barriers to lending due to collateralization requirements from our funders. Welcome state partnership to create a guarantee or alternative collateral pool for lenders taking higher risks.

Regional Convening

• Many Districts serve a regional governance function by convening key partners on critical needs, such as child care and workforce development, workforce housing, and other issues that are critical to readiness for economic development.

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Districts: Other Functions

Direct Business Services, such as

- Entrepreneurship training and 1 on 1 advising
- "Case management"/triage approach connecting businesses to other services

Services to Local communities, such as

- Resource development/grant writing and grant administration
- Planning assistance
- "Economy of scale" staffing services



OEDD Services

OEDD serves the Districts by...

Serving as a Venue for Information Sharing and Coordination

- Our monthly and quarterly meetings are space for information dissemination, creative problem-solving, coordination, mutual needs identification, and coordination.
 - Attended by Districts, state and federal agencies, foundations, university partners, etc.



OEDD serves the Districts by...

Statewide Project Development, such as

- Coordinated approach to COVID-19 Economic Recovery Plans
- Oregon Economic Ecosystem Project (U. of Oregon IPRE lead)
- Eclipse/Economic Resilience Assessments and Plans

Advocacy and Engagement

- We track relevant state and federal legislation, and provide critical information on needs, the potential impacts of different decisions, service delivery mechanisms, etc.
- Two current items on our list: HB 2345 (Rural Capacity Fund/grantwriting); SBDC funding.



To summarize, Oregon's EDDs and OEDD provide support to our businesses, communities, and regions; collaboratively identify regional priorities; disseminate information and services for state and federal agencies and partners... and generally serve as a nexus between the top-down and the bottom-up.
