Intervenor Funding

- ORS 757.072 (2003) allows energy utilities to enter into agreements to provide financial assistance to organizations participating in PUC proceedings
- The organizations must "represent broad customer interests" and PUC must approve the agreements before financial assistance is provided
- The negotiated agreements—not ORS 757.072—govern the terms and conditions of the intervenor funding assistance



Purpose

- To help defray the costs of intervenors' participation in PUC proceedings
 ➤ "Intervenors" used to describe parties other than utilities and PUC Staff
 ➤ "Proceedings" generally refer to quasi-judicial cases and quasi-legislative rulemakings
- Participation requires resources to appear and present evidence and argument on disputed factual, technical, policy, and legal issues
- Provide PUC with more robust evidentiary records and information to support decision-making




Existing Agreements

- Under ORS 757.072, Oregon's investor-owned energy utilities have agreements with the two non-profit ratepayer organizations
 - ➢Citizens' Utility Board CUB (residential ratepayers)
 - ► Alliance of Western Energy Users AWEC (industrial electric and gas customers)
- Organizations were created as ratepayer advocates, and had a history of advocating on behalf of residential and industrial customers in PUC proceedings



Eligible Expenses

Intervenor funds may only be used to defray expenses directly attributable to participation in PUC proceedings





Funding Mechanics

- CUB and Matching (AWEC) Funds upon request the PUC orders payment by utilities to intervenors
- Issue Fund case by case process:
 - Submit proposed budgets
 - End of case request for payment
 - PUC review and order utility to pay
- Utilities ultimately collect amounts paid from ratepayers



Collection from Ratepayers

• The agreements require that the grants be allocated to and paid by the customer class benefiting from the representation

➤CUB grants paid by residential customers

► AWEC grants paid by the industrial customers

- Consistent with requirement that groups represent "broad ratepayer interests"
- Aligns with principle no taxation without representation
