



Licensee Overview




Licensee Geographical Demographics

Veterinarians: 44% practice within tri-counties (Clackamas, Multnomah, Washington Counties); 31% practice in secondary urban counties (Benton, Deschutes, Jackson, Lane, Marion); 25% practice in remaining outlying, rural, counties.

Vet Interns: 56.6% practice within tri-county area; 20% practice within secondary urban counties; 23.4% practice within rural counties.

Certified Vet Techs: 52.4% practice within tri-county area; 25% practice within secondary urban counties; 22.6% practice within rural counties.

Key Performance Measures (KPMs)

- KPM #2: Public Protection Percent of decisions not contested, appealed, and/or upheld on appeal.
 - OVMEB has met this 95% target every year but the measure's current wording may lead to general, unanticipated abuses and results counter to public protection: possible fostering of reluctance to move forward with discipline or litigation on cases that warrant such action; closing cases prematurely or before board review; or settling cases that should be more fully adjudicated.

KPM #4: Best Practices – Percent of best practices met by the Board.

OVMEB has not reported any data for this KPM in 3 of the last 5 reporting years. There appears to be insufficient information for this KPM to be measured accurately and is not consistent with board/agency practice nor with the legislatively mandated reporting requirements using the Best Practices Self-Assessment Guidance form.

COVID Response

- 2021 renewal fees waived for DVMs (active and inactive), CVTs, and CETs.
- Board allowed renewal deadline to be postponed from Dec. 31 to Jan. 31, 2021.
- Temporary rule on abiding by Executive Orders and guidance with regard to emergency declarations was implemented in Aug. 2020 and will lapse Feb. 12, 2021. Board is in rulemaking on a similar, permanent, rule.
- Telemedicine rule was implemented February, 2020.
- Regular and repeated communications to licensees about COVID guidelines, vaccinations, and referrals to resources made.
