Parks = Health and Wellness

Reduced

- Symptoms of ADHD (eg. Kuo & Taylor, 2004)
- Mortality (eg. Villeneuve et al. 2013; Crouse et al. 2018)
- Cardiovascular and Respiratory Illness (eg. Tamoslunas et al. 2014)
- Depression (eg. McEachan et al. 2016; South et al. 2018)
- **Type 2 Diabetes** (eg. Astell-Burt et al. 2014)
- Improved
 - **Wellbeing and Happiness** (eg. MacKerron & Mourato, 2013)
 - Cognitive Development and Brain Function (eg. Dadvand et al. 2015; Dadvand et al. 2016)
 - Life Expectancy (eg. Jonker et. al. 2014)

Impacts of COVID on P and R Agencies

Impacts varied across the state and by agency type

- Districts, small city, large city, county, rural/urban
- Common impacts across all types of agencies:
 - Closed facilities
 - Recreation centers
 - Senior centers
 - Playgrounds
 - Restrooms
 - Boat ramps
 - Trailheads and Natural Area access



Current Impacts

- 80% or more reduction in revenue
- Reduction in staffing levels
 - Maintenance of parks infrastructure
 - Processing and monitoring contracts and contract performance
 - Procurement supplies and equipment
 - Provision of vital cross-training of temp staffing
 - Enforcement rules and regulations in parks
 - Services for vulnerable populations including seniors, children, therapeutic
 - Reduced structure/supports in young peoples lives

Long-Term Impacts

- Deferred capital projects
- Loss of institutional knowledge
- Reduced capacity to reopen needed facilities
- Potential for reduction in regulatory compliance
- Decreased ability to meet service needs

Recovery from COVID Impacts

- Increase in demand and record park usage.
- Significant reductions to agency budgets and staffing levels.
- Need to continue access to Senior Centers, recreation facilities, natural areas and trailheads.
- Need for new and diversified funding mechanisms and sources to fulfill essential physical and mental health services, facilities and parks.
