County-by-County Administration



- School district superintendents are the primary point of contact between LPHAs, health systems and eligible educators in their district
- Private school leaders are the primary point of contact between LPHAs, health systems and eligible educators for their school staff
- K-12 educators are organized through their employers
- Often vaccination clinics are set-up on school campuses



More Vaccine is Needed



- There are more than 150,000 educators, school staff, child care workers and early learning center staff eligible to receive the COVID-19 vaccine.
- Oregon does not receive enough vaccines to meet the needs of phase 1a, educators, and our elders.
- There were about 72,000 vaccines allocated to educators over the first 3 weeks of this effort.
- Meeting our vaccination goals depends on getting enough vaccine supply from the federal government.

Eligible Staff



Eligible public and private K-12 school system staff include district paid and contracted staff, inclusive of: Teachers • Substitute teachers • Paraprofessionals • Bus drivers • Custodians - maintenance - facilities • Nutrition staff • School office staff • School administrators • Counselors and mental health support staff • Heath staff • Childcare staff • Library staff • Other educators and school staff in the school • Student and practicum teachers and their supervisors • Early Intervention/Early Childhood Special Education staff • Coaches and officials • Extracurricular and program staff (including community partners who provide services to students and families on school campuses, as well as programs like outdoor school) • District and education service district staff who spend time on school campuses (teacher coaches, TOSAs, IT, etc.)



Optional - Local Vaccine Sequencing

School Level Sequencing

- Equity: Prioritize staff at schools that serve marginalized and underserved communities first, especially those communities disproportionately impacted by COVID-19. This can include students of color; students who are citizens of Native American Indian Tribes; students with disabilities; emerging bilingual students; and students navigating poverty, homelessness, and foster care; and other students who have historically experienced disparities in our schools.
- In-Person Instruction and Services: Prioritize staff at schools that are providing in-person instruction and/or other services to the largest population of students first.

Individual Sequencing– It may *not* be practical or necessary to prioritize beyond the school level. However, if there is a need to prioritize staff within a school, consider these factors:

- Equity: This includes staff at schools who are or who live with household members who are of communities that have been disproportionately impacted by COVID-19.
- **Vulnerability**: This includes staff with the closest contact to students (especially those who support personal needs including but not limited to feeding, diapering, breathing support, or other hands-on support) and staff with the most regular and consistent contact with students during in-person instruction (teachers, educational assistants, etc.).
