The agency is requesting its 2021-23 budget to be approved at the Continuing Service Level (CSL) based on the 2019-2021 Legislatively Approved Budget:

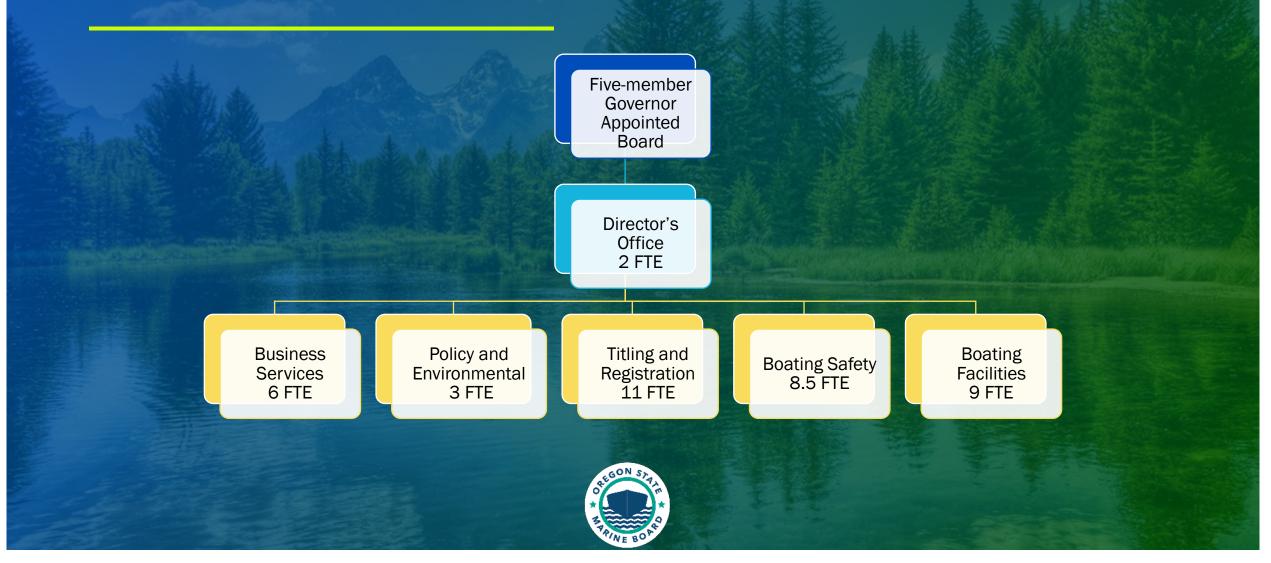
- No major changes in expenditure level (Only inflation adjustments in selected items)
- No new hiring or staff reductions.

Keeping the same level of expenditure will guarantee the agency can continue serving boaters by:

- Maintaining law enforcement activities,
- Continuing to grant funds to entities for new boating facility projects and to maintain their current boat facilities.
- Providing training and education to boaters, partners, and law enforcement officers.
- Implementing and improving boating regulations.

Aquatic Invasive Species Program 23,038 inspections in 2020255 boats contaminated; 10 had zebra or quagga mussels

Law Enforcement

- 31,610 boat stops and inspections
- 6,746 boats stopped for
- 10,508 separate violations, including:
 - 1402 adult PFD violations
 - 59 child PFD violations
 - 513 BEC violations
 - 52 BUII, unsafe and reckless operation violations.



Law Enforcement

Officers responded to 879 incidents including:

- 14 boat fires
- 156 vessel capsizings
- 26 collisions with other boats or fixed objects
- 45 drowning and body recoveries
- 110 non-emergency tow assists
- 68 suicide / attempted suicides
- 107 suicides and drowning recoveries



Boating Facilities

2019-2021 biennium

- Leveraged \$3.38 million of state boater funds and \$721,243 federal boater funds for:
 - Property acquisition: .42 acres
 - Nonmotorized education and outreach to underserved communities: 2 projects

Boating Facilities

39 renovated facilities with a total cost of \$8.8 million. 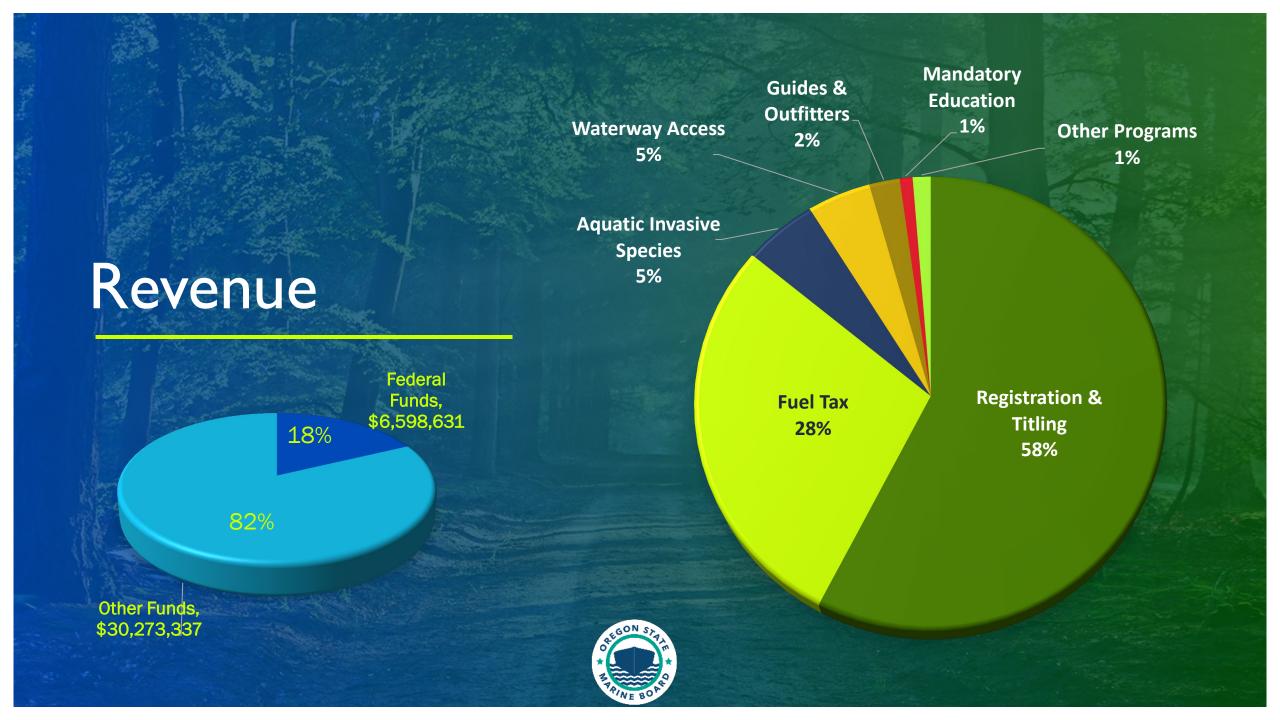

COVID Impacts

Agency Impacts

- The agency's office remains closed to the public.
- Staff has been working on reaching out boaters and finding alternative ways to communicate with them.
- Registration renewals and other duties have not been impacted for the office closure. 99% of the fees that the agency collects are processed either by mail or online.
- The agency adapted quickly to the State guidelines and most of the staff has been able to telework and/or perform their job duties in the workplace under safe conditions.

Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF)

- The agency did not claim any *Direct Response Cost* reimbursement.
- The amount of *In Relation to Cost* expended since the beginning of the pandemic amounts \$ 13,124 (cell phone service and IT equipment).



Wildfire Impacts

- Five major river basins effected
- Anticipate debris and boating obstructions from dead trees for years
- The Agency is applying for \$1 million FEMA grant to address hazard removal
- Boating access facilities affected during the fires and for years to come
