To: Chair Kathleen Taylor, Senate Committee on Redistricting Re: Comments on the Oregon State 2021 redistricting process

Redistricting plans should be developed independently of the Legislature. A long-standing goal of both the LWVOR and LWVUS is to use independent Citizens' Redistricting Commissions in this process. Responsibility for redistricting preferably should be vested in an independent special commission, with membership that reflects the diversity of the unit of government, including citizens at large, representatives of public interest groups, and members of minority groups.

For the 2021 Oregon redistricting process in the seven months before the Census Bureau redistricting data is expected to be received, **I urge the Legislature to at least create an independent citizens' advisory commission**, as more than a dozen other states have already done.

I support the League of Women Voters Oregon's recommendation to the Legislative Assembly to use this year's general session to propose for the 2022 ballot a Constitutional amendment creating a citizens' redistricting commission comparable to that proposed by People Not Politicians (PNP) in 2020 (IP 57). More than 64,000 signatures demonstrate the popularity of IP 57 among Oregon voters.
