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A simple upgrade to the way we vote

Instead of "choose one," may rank:
 1st, 2nd, 3rd

 2nd and 3rd choices mattering improves campaigns

Over 10 million Americans use RCV today

How It Works

- Single-winner (winner-take-all)
 - Requires majority support 50%
 - Prevents electing <u>unpopular candidates</u>

- Multi-winner (proportional RCV)
 - Results mirror population
 - Beyond the scope for today
