




### Weekly topline points | from the week of April 5-9

- +125 cleared sites completed this week for a total of 1,189 statewide (out of 2,824 total home sites).
- Hazard tree marking and removal steadily progressing: 64,800 trees marked and 23,169 removed. We continue to hear a mix of strong reactions to the noticeable changes in the landscape left by the 2020 wildfires.
- Ongoing call for Right-of-Entry submissions. We want to ensure all property owners
  have the option to participate. For those with an existing ROE choosing to go a different
  route with their cleanup plans, please send us an update.
- Worth a recap: property cleanup is a series of steps that are completed over time. The debris removal process is often well underway before heavy machinery and dump trucks show up.
- No more lives lost to the 2020 wildfires. The 2020 wildfires forever changed landscapes and left thousands of dead or dying trees in its wake, towering next to our communities and roadways. Removing these hazard trees is our top safety priority to ensure no more lives are lost at the hands of the 2020 wildfires now and into the future.




