

HB 2650 A STAFF MEASURE SUMMARY

Senate Committee On Health Care

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Meeting Dates: 5/3

WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:

Allows emergency medical services (EMS) provider to transport a police dog injured in the line of duty for emergency treatment so long as the transportation does not delay or otherwise interfere with the emergency transportation of a human. Defines "police dog." Takes effect 91st day following adjournment sine die.

House Vote: *Passed. Ayes, 47; Excused, 13.*

FISCAL: *No fiscal impact.*

REVENUE: *No revenue impact.*

ISSUES DISCUSSED:

- Importance and costs of police dogs
- Types of treatments that injured police dogs might need
- Similar laws in other states

EFFECT OF AMENDMENT:

No amendment.

BACKGROUND:

Many law enforcement agencies use specially trained dogs to help apprehend suspects or find contraband or explosives. Police dogs are sometimes injured during these activities and require emergency transportation and treatment.
