VOLUNTARY IN-HOME VISITING AND PARENT EDUCATION

Home visiting programs help new and expectant parents develop the skills and confidence it takes to raise healthy families. Home visiting prevents adversity and builds resilience during a child's most critical years of development, shown by reduced child abuse and neglect, fewer low birth weight babies, and improved school readiness for children.

Healthy Families America® (HFA) is the nationally-recognized, evidence-based home visiting program of Prevent Child Abuse America®. HFA focuses on building nurturing, safe and secure relationships between parent and child to maximize opportunities for all children -and parents- to reach their full potential.

49% fewer substantiated child protective service reports among young, first-time moms who enrolled early in pregnancy with children between 5-7 years old.

Reduction in the recurrence of child maltreatment by 1/3.



More positive discipline with less yelling and less physical punishment.

VOLUNTARY IN-HOME VISITING AND PARENT EDUCATION

- In 2020, nearly 600 eligible families requesting services were left out of Healthy Families Oregon (HFO) due to a lack of funding to the program.
- A \$10 million investment would expand the number of families the program serves and prepare for growth (e.g., secure a database, address home visitor pay parody, and more.)
- Prepare for anticipated new referrals as Family Connects
 Oregon, a universally offered home visiting program through
 OHA, rolls out statewide.

For these reasons, we support a \$10 million dollar biennial increase in the Healthy Families Oregon budget.
