Requires Board on Public Safety Standards and Training to ensure all police officers and certified reserve officers receive training related to investigating, identifying, and reporting crimes motivated by prejudice based on perceived gender of the victim.

BACKGROUND:

The minimum statewide qualifications for employment as a law enforcement officer are established in rule by the Department of Public Safety Standards and Training (DPSST). The rules specify that all law enforcement officers must receive training on the investigation, identification and reporting of crimes motivated by prejudice based on perceived race, color, religion, national origin, sexual orientation, marital status, political affiliation or beliefs, membership or activity in or on behalf of a labor organization or against a labor organization, physical or mental disability, age, economic or social status or citizenship of the victim (see OAR 259-008-0085(1)(b)(E)).

House Bill 2986 adds a requirement for training related to investigating, identifying, and reporting crimes motivated by prejudice based on perceived gender of the victim.
