

## HB 2068 -3, -4 STAFF MEASURE SUMMARY

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#### WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:

Makes permanent the provisions related to the issuance and use of landowner preference tags for hunting deer, elk, or antelope.

#### ISSUES DISCUSSED:

##### EFFECT OF AMENDMENT:

-3 Extends sunset on landowner preference program until January 2, 2026. Directs Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife to review sales of landowner preference tags, including sales made for the purpose of raising funds for non-profit organizations and other purposes, and report to an interim legislative committee on or before September 15, 2024.

-4 Extends sunset on landowner preference program until January 2, 2026.

*FISCAL: Minimal fiscal impact*

*REVENUE: No revenue impact*

#### BACKGROUND:

The Landowner Preference Program (LOP) is a hunting program for landowners that was established in recognition of the role that private lands play in supporting wildlife. Deer, elk, or antelope tags are available to landowners and their family members, based on the acreage owned, and are restricted to use on the property for which they are registered. The program does not require landowners to be successful in the controlled hunt draw for the unit in which their property resides. LOP tags for the hunting of deer or elk are transferable to any person of the landowner's choosing, whereas LOP tags for the hunting of antelope are not transferable. The LOP program is scheduled to sunset on January 2, 2022.

House Bill 2068 would make the provisions regarding issuance and use of landowner preference tags for hunting wildlife permanent by eliminating the sunset date.
