HIGHER EDUCATION IN PRISON

PORTLAND STATE UNIVERSITY

History

Our program was started by two women who were both directly impacted by a broken criminal justice system: one a former criminal defense attorney, the other a formerly incarcerated mother. In collaboration with a group of incarcerated people at CCCF advocating for educational opportunities, they imagined a comprehensive program designed to ignite a love of learning in a population that has been the most historically underserved segment of incarcerated people in Oregon.

The vision: a program that supported students inside carceral settings as well as on the PSU campus.

Timeline

2018

- PSU Program founded as Reverse the {school to prison} Pipeline (now PSU's Higher Education in Prison Program)
- College Navigator first available for formerly incarcerated students on PSU campus
- First meeting with Rubicon GPS at CCCF
- Steering Committee formed

2019

• Initial class offered at CCCF: *Metamorphosis* (Freshman Inquiry) to 20 students. 15 credit, year-long interdisciplinary general education.

2020

- second year of Liberal Arts degree pathway at CCCF
- provided higher education to 45 women
- courses include include general education, business, writing, family studies, public health and natural sciences.
- offer 43 interdisciplinary credits; building a transcript.

2021

Ten students currently seeking full admission to PSU; more to follow




Racial Justice

In our original cohort, 15% of participants identified as BIPOC. In our second cohort, this percentage doubled.

We are increasing and strengthening the participation and leadership of Black, Indigenous and People of Color in our program, and striving to dismantle whiteness, by approaching both teaching and learning with an anti-racist focus.

We were selected by the Alliance for Higher Education in Prison to participate in a Reading Project. Our leadership team, consisting of members inside and outside of the prison, will be reading Dr. Bettina Love's We Want to Do MoreThan Survive: Abolitionist Teaching and the Pursuit of Educational Freedom and using the text and additional resources provided to explore and strengthen the anti-racist focus of our work.
