
A 'desert' is where there is 3 times more children than slots

Pre-pandemic child care deserts


All 36 Oregon Counties are child care deserts for infants and toddlers.

All but **11** counties were child care deserts for Preschool age children^Q Public contracts accounts for a **quarter** of preschool supply & **8%** of infant/toddler supply a

Percent of children with potential access to a slot varies across and within counties.^Q



Public funding contributes to supply, especially in nonmetro counties.



Child care is expensive, yet wages are low

Median annual price of toddler care in a center is over \$15,590^b

Median hourly center teacher wages range between \$12.91 - \$18.00^c

Oregon families fund 72% of annual child care expenditures^b

24% of the 2018 Oregon workforce left the field by 2019. \subseteq
