Measure Description:

Includes as unlawful practice medical provider's denial of treatment that is likely to benefit patient based on patient's race, color, national origin, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, age or disability.

Analysis:

This fiscal impact statement is for the purpose of transmitting the measure from the Senate Committee on Health Care to the Joint Committee on Ways and Means.

The measure declares that it is unlawful practice for a health care provider or any person acting on behalf of a provider to deny medical treatment to a patient that is likely to benefit the patient based on an individualized assessment of the patient using objective medical evidence, or to limit or restrict in any manner the allocation of medical resources to a patient, based on the patient's race, color, national origin, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, age, or disability.

The measure is anticipated to have an impact on the Department of Justice, Oregon Judicial Department, Department of Corrections, Oregon Health Authority, and state health professional regulatory boards.

A more complete fiscal analysis on the measure will be prepared as the measure is considered in the Joint Committee on Ways and Means.
