SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

[Directs Oregon Conservation and Recreation Advisory Committee to consult with Office of Outdoor Recreation when making recommendations regarding use of Oregon Conservation and Recreation Fund moneys. Appropriates matching moneys.] Appoints Associate Director of Outdoor Recreation, or designee, as nonvoting, ex officio member of Oregon Conservation and Recreation Advisory Committee. Appropriates moneys to Oregon Conservation and Recreation Fund. Limits distributions from fund to amounts matching deposits from certain other sources. Repeals sunset.

Directs State Parks and Recreation Department to establish statewide **recommended** standards for design of recreation projects. Directs department to ensure existing recreation facilities comply with statewide **recommended** standards no later than January 2, 2025.

Establishes Outdoor Recreation Advisory Committee within Office of Outdoor Recreation.

Directs Office of Outdoor Recreation to maintain website with links to agency websites with information regarding how to purchase outdoor recreation passes, permits or licenses. Directs office to study and make recommendations for legislation necessary to create single online storefront for outdoor recreation passes. Requires office to submit recommendations to Legislative Assembly by September 15, 2021.

Directs Office of Outdoor Recreation to submit annual inventory and gap analysis of outdoor recreation infrastructure to Legislative Assembly.

Directs Office of Outdoor Recreation to study and make recommendations for legislation to increase access to outdoor recreation in Oregon. [Directs office to study and make recommendations for legislation necessary to ensure membership of committees advising agencies regarding outdoor recreation reflects geographic, racial, ethnic and gender diversity.] Requires office to submit report on findings to Legislative Assembly by September 15, 2022.

Directs Office of Outdoor Recreation, in collaboration with Oregon Business Development Department, to design and propose legislation to implement grant program to support outdoor recreation products organizations and accelerators. Requires office to submit proposed legislation to Legislative Assembly by September 15, 2022.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

Relating to outdoor recreation; creating new provisions; amending ORS 390.233 and section 2,
chapter 531, Oregon Laws 2019; repealing sections 4, 5 and 6, chapter 531, Oregon Laws 2019;
and declaring an emergency.
Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

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OREGON CONSERVATION AND RECREATION FUND

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- SECTION 1. Section 2, chapter 531, Oregon Laws 2019, is amended to read:

10 Sec. 2. (1) The Oregon Conservation and Recreation Advisory Committee is established as an 11 advisory committee to the State Fish and Wildlife Commission and the State Department of Fish and

12 Wildlife for the purpose of carrying out the duties described in subsection (2) of this section. The

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commission shall determine the number of members of the committee and the geographical repre-

2 sentation by the members. The Governor shall appoint the members of the committee. **The Associ**-

ate Director of Outdoor Recreation, or the associate director's designee, shall serve as a

4 nonvoting, ex officio member.

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5 (2) The committee shall review department policies regarding the use of Oregon Conservation 6 and Recreation Fund moneys and make recommendations to the commission and the department re-7 garding the use of fund moneys for implementing and administering department activities.

8 (3) Members of the committee may not receive compensation for service as members. However, 9 subject to any applicable law regulating travel and other expenses of state officers and employees, 10 a member may be reimbursed for actual and necessary travel and other expenses incurred in the 11 performance of official duties from moneys available to the department for the purpose of re-12 imbursement of committee members.

(4) The department and the committee jointly shall submit a biennial report to the Legislative
Assembly as provided in ORS 293.640 regarding the expenditure of moneys deposited in the Oregon
Conservation and Recreation Fund established under section 1 [of this 2019 Act], chapter 531,
Oregon Laws 2019, and on the status of various activities funded by the moneys.

17 <u>SECTION 2.</u> In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropri-18 ated to the Emergency Board, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, out of the General 19 Fund, the amount of \$1,000,000, to be allocated to the State Department of Fish and Wildlife 20 for the purposes of the Oregon Conservation and Recreation Fund. However, the board may 21 only release the appropriation in increments that match the actual deposits made to the 22 Oregon Conservation and Recreation Fund from July 1, 2019, to June 30, 2023, from sources 23 other than state government, as defined in ORS 174.111.

SECTION 3. Sections 4, 5 and 6, chapter 531, Oregon Laws 2019, are repealed.

25 <u>SECTION 3a.</u> If this 2021 Act does not become effective until after June 30, 2021, the 26 Legislative Assembly intends that the repeal of section 5, chapter 531, Oregon Laws 2019, by 27 section 3 of this 2021 Act operates retroactively to June 30, 2021. Any otherwise lawful action 28 or otherwise lawful obligation undertaken under authority of section 1, chapter 531, Oregon 29 Laws 2019, on or after July 1, 2021, and before the effective date of this 2021 Act is ratified 30 and approved.

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STATEWIDE DESIGN STANDARDS

<u>SECTION 4.</u> (1) The State Parks and Recreation Department shall establish statewide recommended standards for the design of recreation projects, including trails, docks and public recreation access points, to ensure that state recreation areas are accessible to members of the public of all mobility levels.

(2) The department shall apply the statewide recommended standards to all future de partment recreation projects.

40 <u>SECTION 5.</u> (1) The State Parks and Recreation Department shall develop the standards 41 described in section 4 of this 2021 Act no later than September 15, 2022.

(2) No later than January 2, 2025, the State Parks and Recreation Department shall ensure that all existing recreation facilities are in compliance with the statewide standards for
the design of recreation projects developed under section 4 of this 2021 Act.

45 <u>SECTION 6.</u> Section 5 of this 2021 Act is repealed on July 31, 2025.

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OUTDOOR RECREATION ADVISORY COMMITTEE 1 2 SECTION 7. (1) The Outdoor Recreation Advisory Committee is established as an advi-3 sory committee to the Office of Outdoor Recreation for the purpose of carrying out the du-4 ties described in subsection (2) of this section. The State Parks and Recreation Director, 5 upon consultation with the State Parks and Recreation Commission, shall determine the 6 number of members of the committee. The Governor shall appoint the members of the 7 committee, taking into consideration the geographic, racial, ethnic and gender diversity of 8 9 this state and ensuring that a majority of the committee members represent historically underserved communities. 10 (2) The committee shall advise the Associate Director of Outdoor Recreation and make 11 12 recommendations on statewide outdoor recreation policy under ORS 390.233 by: (a) Reviewing statewide capacity for civic engagement in outdoor recreation planning and 13 making recommendations to the office regarding options for increasing civic engagement; 14 15 (b) Evaluating and making recommendations for improvements to current equity, diversity and inclusion efforts regarding outdoor recreation planning; 16 17(c) Providing recommendations for establishing and enhancing opportunities for safe and 18 comfortable outdoor tourism and recreation for communities of color, members of lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer or questioning (LGBTQ) communities, people with disabili-19 20ties and other historically marginalized groups; (d) Facilitating input from Indian tribes and tribal organizations; 2122(e) Facilitating collaboration with other agency advisory committees; and 23(f) Providing recommendations and facilitating public input regarding any other issues regarding increasing public access to outdoor recreation. 24(3) Members of the advisory committee are not entitled to compensation, but in the dis-25cretion of the State Parks and Recreation Director may be reimbursed from funds available 2627to the State Parks and Recreation Department for actual and necessary travel and other expenses incurred by them in the performance of their official duties in the manner and 28amount provided in ORS 292.495. 2930 31 **OUTDOOR RECREATION PASSES** 32SECTION 8. The Office of Outdoor Recreation shall work with each state agency that 33 34 issues outdoor recreation passes, permits or licenses, including the State Parks and Recreation Department, State Department of Fish and Wildlife, Department of Transportation and 35 State Marine Board, to add links from the Office of Outdoor Recreation website to the 36 37 agency websites that provide information about how to purchase the outdoor recreation 38 passes, permits or licenses. SECTION 9. (1) The Office of Outdoor Recreation, in consultation with the Outdoor Re-39 creation Advisory Committee, shall study and make recommendations for legislation neces-40 sary to create a single online storefront for outdoor recreation passes. 41 (2) The office shall submit the legislation recommended under this section to the appro-42

priate committee or committees of the Legislative Assembly no later than September 15,
2021.

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(a) Other information about the office's activities; or 45

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(b) Recommendations, which may include recommendations for legislation, on policies and initi-1 2 atives that may be adopted by the legislature, the State Parks and Recreation Department or other state agencies to enhance the experiences of persons engaging in outdoor recreation in this state. 3 4 **INCREASING ACCESS TO OUTDOOR RECREATION AND PRODUCTS** 5 6 SECTION 12. (1) The Office of Outdoor Recreation shall study and make recommen-7 dations for legislation regarding options for increasing public access to outdoor recreation, 8 9 including by: (a) Addressing disincentives in Oregon's recreational immunity law. 10 (b) Increasing public and private funding to support outdoor recreation access in Oregon. 11 12 (c) Expanding access and habitat programs. (d) Collaborating with state institutions of higher education to expand educational offer-13 ings related to the outdoor recreation economy. 14 (e) Increasing the availability of prize moneys for state-permitted recreation events. 15 (2) The office shall submit reports on its findings and any proposed legislation under this 16 section to the appropriate committee or committees of the Legislative Assembly no later 17 than September 15, 2022. 18 SECTION 13.
