Senate Bill 399

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced.**

Provides that refusal to obey lawful order issued by peace officer or parole and probation officer does not constitute crime of interfering with a peace officer or parole and probation officer unless order is to move back and keep distance while officer is performing lawful duties.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

Relating to the crime of interfering with a peace officer or parole and probation officer; amending 2 ORS 162.247. 3 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon: **SECTION 1.** ORS 162.247 is amended to read: 5 162.247. (1) A person commits the crime of interfering with a peace officer or parole and pro-6 bation officer if the person, knowing that another person is a peace officer or a parole and probation officer as defined in ORS 181A.355: 8 (a) Intentionally acts in a manner that prevents, or attempts to prevent, a peace officer or parole 9 and probation officer from performing the lawful duties of the officer with regards to another person; 10 11 12 (b) Refuses to obey a lawful order, issued by the peace officer or parole and probation officer, to move back and keep a safe distance from the officer while the officer is conducting an 13 investigation, issuing or serving a citation to another person or performing other lawful du-14 15 (2) Interfering with a peace officer or parole and probation officer is a Class A misdemeanor. 16 (3) This section does not apply in situations in which the person is engaging in: 17 (a) Activity that would constitute resisting arrest under ORS 162.315; or 18 19 (b) Passive resistance.
