Written Testimony on Behalf of the Oregon Advocacy Commissions Office

March 3, 2021

To the Members of the Joint Committee on Ways and Means General Government Subcommittee:

My name is Natalie Brant, and I am a Reference Librarian at the State Library of Oregon. I am the liaison librarian to the Oregon Advocacy Commissions Office, and I wanted to impart to the Committee what a fulfilling and positive partnership the State Library and the Oregon Advocacy Commissions Office (OACO) share.

I have been working directly with the OACO since 2017 and have provided research resources and support for many of their policy reports. Most of these policy reports are focused on raising up underserved populations in Oregon and giving them a voice, as well as clearing their paths to equality and enabling their success. The work that the Commissions do has only become more essential in light of the increase in racially motivated violence against many of these populations, as can be seen in the Senate Bill 577 report released in July 2020 from the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission. The necessity of the work of the Commissions is also shown in the disparities that have been highlighted during the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic for these underserved populations in our state.
