Dear Chair Nathanson, Vice Chair Reschke, Vice-Chair Pham, Members of the Committee:

I am writing to you today on behalf of the Oregon Housing Alliance to express our support for HB 2819, which would expand eligibility for the Earned Income Tax Credit, or EITC.

The Oregon Housing Alliance is a coalition of more than ninety organizations from all parts of the state. Our members have come together with the knowledge that housing opportunity is the foundation on which all of our success is built – individual success as students, parents, workers, and community members as well as the success of our communities. We represent a diverse set of voices including affordable housing developers, residents of affordable housing, local jurisdictions, and organizations working to meet basic needs in every corner of our state.

We believe that all Oregonians need a safe, stable, and affordable place to call home.

Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, we knew that already, too many seniors, families, and people who experience disabilities were paying too much of their income towards rent, and were experiencing other forms of housing instability. In Oregon, three out of four households with extremely low incomes pay over half of their income towards rent. When people pay that much of their income towards rent, they have too few resources left over for food, medicine, or utilities. An emergency of a few hundred dollars may mean they end up experiencing homelessness.

The Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) puts money into household budgets. Housing Alliance members across our state know that families are struggling to build better futures for themselves, their children, and their grandchildren. Expanding eligibility for the state earned income tax credit will mean more Oregon families who are better able to make ends meet.

HB 2819 would expand who is eligible to receive the EITC to include people who file their taxes using an Individual Taxpayer Identification Number, or ITIN. In the State of Oregon, there are roughly 34,000 families – predominately Latinx and Asian Americans – who file their taxes using an Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN), yet have no ability to access the EITC.

A filer who is a U.S. citizen, but lives in a mixed-status household finds themselves with the same dilemma in qualifying for the EITC. The federal EITC also requires that every person claimed in a tax return have a Social Security Number, and Oregon uses the same criteria, which is estimated to negatively impact nearly 90,000 Oregonians who are U.S. citizens, including

70,000 citizen children who would stand to benefit from their parent or guardian from accessing the EITC.

The Earned Income Tax Credit has been proven to have benefits that last beyond the immediate income boost. We know that living with low incomes puts strains on children, schools, and families. Children whose families have received the EITC do better in school, and the EITC has even been shown to improve earnings as children become adults.

The EITC is often used by families to help them make one-time significant purchases, for example new car tires that can stand up to a long commute to work. Other households use the EITC to pay down debt, or create an emergency fund. Additional household income used in this way can support housing stability, by helping households become more resilient to the setbacks that Oregonians at every income level face.

We urge your support of HB 2819. Expanding eligibility of the EITC will make lasting impacts on Oregon families and children.
