Landlords are a key part of providing affordable, sustainable housing. The state of Oregon must think of not only tenants, but also landlords, when it develops proposed legislation. The result is many long-term, strong landlords are selling their homes, liquidating their assets, and leaving the state. The ultimate result of the tenant/landlord laws in Oregon is out of state/absentee landlords buying the assets, because they are the people who are most likely to afford the inflated prices.
