NAYA's wraparound programs directly serve over 2,000 individual Native American youth, adults, and Elders every year and positively impacts more than 10,000 lives throughout Portland's growing urban Native community. Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, our organization has continues to provide direct social services for communities in need.

Oregon's addiction and overdose crisis disproportionately impacts the Black, Native/Indigenous, Latinx, and LGBTQ2+ communities. SB 755 will increase access to low-barrier, culturally-responsive treatment, recovery, housing and harm-reduction services to those who need and want it. It is time that we invest in more culturally specific treatment and support services to best ensure we can reach people where they are culturally, mentally and physically. Furthermore, we have an opportunity to invest in and stand up for our youth by providing treatment, recovery, housing and harm-reduction services to our most vulnerable population.
