I would like to convey my sincerest thanks to the Oregon State Marine Board (OSMB) and all of the employees who are genuine stewards of Oregon's waterways.

When one considers the amount of services provided versus the revenues the OSMB has to stitch together we must stand in awe of the accomplishments.

The program presented offered an insight into problem areas of concern.

- The costs of Abandoned and Derelict Vessel Removals is alarming and I suspect this sector is going to increase as a result of COVID-19 related economic influences.
- The number of suicides and drowning recoveries is unfortunate. The reporting of the total costs incurred would be helpful information for budgeting purposes.
- Law Enforcement costs are going to steadily increase and funding must be secured to address the reality-too many idiots on the water causing problems.
- The conflict concerning "Wake-boats" are only going to get worse. [HB 2275] and [HB 2555] are in the hopper but, are hot-button issues requiring steadfast leadership. The "Wake-Boat" community has their fair share of trouble makers. The Newberg Pool Congested Zone should be off-limits to these vessels for a number of legitimate reasons. [HB 2734] would create an additional source of revenue but, [HB 2734] is discriminatory taxing scheme and should be avoided. Any excise tax is going to ignite voter related passions.
