The Oregon Legislature should provide guidance on the composition of the Oregon State Marine Board. The Oregon Legislature hasn't examined the composition of the Marine Board in sixty years. The same old establishment no longer works.

Environmental concerns did not really exist, nor did damages caused by recreational boaters.
