

I strongly urge you to vote against Senate Bill 223.

Senate Bill 223 is an infringement on our ability to choose the best education for our children. It is no secret that private schools perform better than public schools in educating the youth of Oregon. Oregon public schools currently rank 40th in the nation. The Oregon Department of Education (ODE) has proven themselves inadequate to build and lead a successful educational system. If private schools were subject to the same governing body as public schools, they would suffer the same fate. Privately run schools are a great asset to Oregon, safeguarding families from suffering the same abysmal education found in its public schools.

Private schools should be run by people who represent their students' families' core values. The private school our family supports is run by a School Board that consists of members elected by the families who attend the school.
