Re: Senate Bill 262

Dear Chair Senator Wagner, Vice-Chair Senator Girod, and members of the Committee:

If it were possible, I am more than wholly opposed to SB 262, which is an obvious and blatant legislative tactic to punish members of the legislature from some imagined poor behavior.

*Unexcused absences*, eh? As if grown adults are children being admonished by the elementary school hall monitor. However, childish behavior is precisely what the (un-named) sponsors of this bill are exhibiting. In the real world, an *unexcused absence* is only such—until it isn't.

Upon first viewing this proposal might hold some water. But given more consideration this is a meaningless bill and a waste of the legislature's time. A bone tossed to the majority party's supporters.
