Imagine for yourselves the consequences of this explosion and 3 alarm fire that prompted the evacuation of 80 homes and businesses, including the nearby Walmart, and necessitated bring in a special foam truck from the Portland International Airport with an agent called Purple K. Place this plant instead in farmland surrounded by fields of ripening grain, or the forests of Chehalem mountain, or the plains of central Oregon with no access to fire hydrants or special foam. This would not have been just a structure fire; this would have been a raging wildland fire threating the homes and livelihoods of 100's of Oregonians.

Ethanol or Butane is what is used to chemically refine hemp and marijuana. It is highly explosive and very difficult to put out once it catches fire. Placing a facility using those chemicals in rural areas defies common sense. Please advance HB3239 and support the common-sense regulation of these facilities.
