HB2464 is a Working Solution to the Shortage of Certified Surgical Technologists in Oregon Health Care Facilities

The COVID-19 pandemic is exacerbating the shortage of qualified Surgical Technologists in Oregon and across the nation. Oregon hospitals offering candidates \$10-15 per hour pay increases struggle to fill positions and retain staff. At least 3 of only 4 training programs in the state delayed or cancelled a 2020 cohort. The **Health Staffing, Apprenticeship and Resources Initiative (Health STAR)** and the Oregon Ambulatory Surgery Center Association (OASCA) have a solution.

HB2464 is supported by certified Surgical Technologists and Ambulatory Surgery Centers (ASCs) across the state and will rapidly expand the staffing pipeline by qualifying successful Health STAR apprentices, who earn wages as they acquire the necessary education and experience in direct patient care, to participate in existing certification exams.

HB2464 will utilize the existing NCCT Accreditation, which has proven comparable to other existing accreditation bodies.
