Chair Wagner and Members of the Committee,

We support Senate Joint Resolution 4, which seeks an amendment to the Oregon Constitution to modify the portion of each house of the Legislative Assembly needed to be in attendance for quorum necessary for a house to conduct business.

Oregonians are enduring crisis on top of crisis -- from the Labor Day wildfires to the Valentine's Day ice storms; the COVID-19 pandemic and the economic fallout to a reckoning with historic and ongoing racial injustice. Now more than ever, we need our elected government to work quickly, boldly, and decisively to help Oregonians through emergencies and make policies to shape a future where we're less vulnerable to all of these crises.

Over the past three years, a small group of legislators elected by a minority of voters has too frequently stopped the peoples' business by refusing to show up and do the job they were elected to do. All the while continuing to collect paychecks funded by our tax dollars. As a result, our state has been less prepared for crisis, stalled from helping communities, businesses, schools, and individuals prepare for health, economic, and climate change-fueled disasters or make progress toward a better future.

There must be serious repercussions for an elected official who refuses to do the job they were elected to do by Oregonians. Anti-democratic behavior must not be tolerated because we've seen it cascade dangerously from rhetoric to walkouts to outright violence at the Oregon and U.S. Capitols recently.

Oregonians elect legislators to show up, debate, make bills better, and then take a vote. That's the expectation and the oath lawmakers swear to upon taking their seats. Refusing to take part in the fairly elected legislature is a violation of that oath and failure to represent their own constituents as well as taking away representation for Oregonians who voted for lawmakers who do show up.
