Dear Chair Fahey, Vice-Chair Morgan, Vice-Chair Campos, Members of the Committee:

I am writing to you today on behalf of the Oregon Housing Alliance to express our support for 3184, which would fund a study of the need for a long-term rent assistance program in Oregon.

The Oregon Housing Alliance is a coalition of more than ninety organizations from all parts of the state. Our members have come together with the knowledge that housing opportunity is the foundation on which all of our success is built – individual success as students, parents, workers, and community members as well as the success of our communities. We represent a diverse set of voices including affordable housing developers, residents of affordable housing, local jurisdictions, and organizations working to meet basic needs in every corner of our state.

We believe that all Oregonians need a safe, stable, and affordable place to call home.

Since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, all of us have spent much more time in our homes. It has become the place where we work, learn, worship, and play. Home has always been essential, and this past year has showed us exactly how essential home is.

Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, we knew that already, too many seniors, families, and people who experience disabilities were paying too much of their income towards their rent or mortgage, and were experiencing other forms of housing instability. In Oregon, three out of four households with extremely low incomes pay over half of their income towards rent. When people pay a significant portion of their income towards rent, they have too little resources left over for food, medicine, utilities, and an emergency may mean they end up experiencing homelessness.

Long-term rent assistance is an effective strategy to prevent homelessness and provide an opportunity for affordable housing for people with low incomes around the state. However, existing resources are insufficient to meet the need. In 2018, approximately 47,000 households in Oregon received rent assistance through federal tenant based or project based vouchers.

These federal programs served one in four households that are eligible for these subsidies, meaning three in four households who are eligible for assistance did not receive it because of a lack of federal resources.

A recent study of long-term rent assistance¹ provided in Multnomah County found that people who received the assistance experienced: an increase in housing stability and the ability to age in place for seniors; improved financial stability; reduced stress and anxiety and improved mental health; and support to address physical health needs.

We need to continue to advance housing solutions for people with the lowest incomes in our communities, and work across the continuum of needs. Long term rent assistance can support families in accessing more choice in housing to live near work or school, and it can provide stability for seniors and people with disabilities who live on fixed incomes. Long term rent assistance can prevent displacement for people and families, and support them to stay in neighborhoods and communities they have lived in for years.

HB 3184 requests that the Legislature should fund a study to examine a long-term rental assistance program. This study should analyze costs to provide long term rent assistance with people experiencing housing instability across Oregon. We urge your support of HB 3184.
