Oppose SB 848 Sections 7 & 9

Preserve Oregon Health Plan Patient Protections

In 2009, the Oregon Health Authority was permitted to require "prior authorization" for medications not listed on the Practitioner-Managed Prescription Drug Plan list ("non-preferred" drugs), subject to exceptions including the following:

- If, after consultation with the Oregon Health Authority, the prescriber, in the prescriber's professional judgment, determines that the drug is medically appropriate;
- It is a mental health drug;
- The request is for a refill for the treatment of seizures, cancer, HIV or AIDS; or
- It is a drug in a class not yet evaluated for the Practitioner-Managed Prescription Drug Plan (i.e., clinical review of the drug class has not been conducted).

OHA's authority to require prior authorization for non-preferred drugs sunset in 2018. While SB 848 would permit the OHA to, once again, restrict access to medications, the bill <u>fails to restore</u> the vital patient protections that tempered this authority previously. Further, the bill <u>eliminates the few</u> <u>existing provisions</u> that serve as checks and balances on the prior authorization program.

We the undersigned, urge opposition to Sections 7 and 9 of SB 848. Patient access to necessary treatment depends on it.
