Psychiatric Care Facility Definition Care Cost to Patient / Insurance

Inpatient Psychiatric Care in Private Hospitals

~ \$1220 per night

Oregon State Hospital (OSH)

~ \$1200 per night

Psychiatric Emergency Services (PES)

~ \$5025.00 per 24 hours

Inpatient Telehealth -The Set Up

- Usually in a craft room, extra TV room, or closet
- Always 1 or 2 staff attendants present to watch equipment and take notes
- Patient may not know attendant
- No privacy with prescriber
- Screen can be a large screen or iPad size
- Sometimes technical WIFI difficulties
- Patients led in one by one like assembly line, usually do not which order
- We did not find any State of Oregon clinical standards on inpatient telehealth

The Problem – Real Life Examples

- 2 years ago in Unity Center for Behavioral Health (Monique)
- 2020 Oregon Patients sent to Rainer Springs in Washington State (Ann)
- 2020 at a Secure Residential Facility (SRTF) at McNary Place (Joe blinded for 4 days because over-medicated)
- Governor Brown's System of Care Council
 Dr. Randy Phelps found children to be "Zombies"

The Solution - Telehealth Choice

SB686 guarantees that you, as a patient, are given the choice and right to receive care from a live, in-person prescriber (psychiatrist, nurse practioner, prescriber, etc.) on-site when you are inpatient or in a secure residential setting.

Not telehealth for outpatient or physical conditions

Senate Bill SB686

Working on an amendment with the Legislative Council (LC) to exclude state-designated rural hospitals and facilities, as well as any other exceptions as needed.

We look forward to collaboration that honors the spirit of telepsychiatry choice.

The Journey to Senate Bill SB686

Spring 2020 - Large committee of youth and BIPOC, and refugees
Oregon Youth Advocate Joseph Stepaneko came up with the choice aspect

Spoke with Senator Frederick who agreed to sponsor the concept

Contacted many in government and Disability Rights Oregon, received no guidance on how to write a bill

Met with many kind legislators to find out what the process is

Launched <u>www.choiceheals.com</u> Provided SB686 in Spanish and English and Launched Online Petition through Change.org <u>www.change.org/choiceheals</u>

The Journey to Senate Bill SB686

- Contacted international academic researchers to get citations
- Met with OHA, Steve Allen and Analisese Dolph
- February 6, 2021 Wrote email to many hospital heads to ask for dialogue on SB686, only Cedar Hills responded
- March 11, 2021 Met with Oregon Hospital Association, asked for barriers for providing in-person prescribers in units, received citations
- Called many rural hospitals and secure residential facilities to come up with an amenable amendment
- Listened to the hospitals and decided to alter bill to address their concerns
