Dear Chair Bynum Members of the Committee,

The City of Portland strongly supports HB 3230, which will expand universal legal representation. The bill reflects a community-centered effort to provide those in detention centers or facing deportation proceedings with access to legal services. The City of Portland has a population of approximately 86,000 immigrants, over 18,000 of which are undocumented and might be able to benefit from this program.

In 2018 the City of Portland joined Multnomah County and the State of Oregon to help fund and launch Equity Corps, which is Oregon's first publicly funded universal representation program. The program provides pro bono legal representation to individuals in removal proceedings. If passed, HB 3230 will build on this program to create a statewide infrastructure for immigration legal defense. West coast cities, such as Seattle and San Francisco, have already implemented programs similar to Equity Corps. Oregon can be a leader in providing equitable representation for immigrants.

HB 3230 extends dignity and respect to people by offering legal counsel to those who cannot afford it. Our obligation to provide these services does not stop at a person's citizenship. Fundamentally, HB 3230 will make our communities safer. We want Portlanders and Oregonians to feel safe regardless of documentation status. When people feel safe, our communities are safer.

HB 3230 helps preserve the integrity of our institutions, extends dignity and respect to residents, and makes our communities safer. We respectfully urge your support.
