Chair Smith Warner, Vice Chair Drazan, Vice Chair Holvey, and members of the committee,

With the overwhelming passage of Measure 107, Oregonians delivered us a mandate to get big money out of politics and deliver on campaign finance reform.

As a young person aspiring to public service, I started out by running for a seat on the Milwaukie City Council in a race that cost less than \$10,000 for me to connect with, and gain support from, my community. Becoming one of the then-youngest elected officials in the state gave me the opportunity to partner with more experienced policy makers who helped me get to where I am today, and to ground me in the work that I am now able to do for my district. I want other Oregonians to be able to follow similar paths.

Oregon is currently one of only five states in the country that does not place a limit on campaign contributions, and increasingly expensive elections – from gubernatorial races all the way down to school board elections – are what we have to show for it. Today, money and the time to fundraise is a barrier that keeps many terrifically qualified candidates from following a path like my own to serve, represent, and better their communities. For this reason, I strongly support HB 3343 to eliminate those barriers to serve, and to eliminate the rising influence of big money in Oregon politics.
