Testimony Before Joint Committee on Ways and Means, Subcommittee on Natural Resources

Subject: HB 5009 – Relating to the Financial Administration of the State Department of Fish and Wildlife

Co-Chair Senator Taylor, Co-Chair Representative Reardon, and members of the Committee,

My name is Kevin Martin, and I live in Pendleton, Oregon. I am the President of the Oregon Chapter Foundation for North American Wild Sheep and I am speaking today on OR FNAWS membership's behalf.

Established in November 1998, the purpose of the Oregon Foundation for North American Wild Sheep (OR FNAWS) is to promote and enhance populations of indigenous wild sheep and rocky mountain goat and their habitat in Oregon and across North America. OR FNAWS supports scientific solutions to resource management challenges, and we heavily invest the funds we raise in disease research, bighorn sheep transplants, habitat management, population management, predator management, and conservation education. We are a proud partner of the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (ODFW) and have been since our establishment.

I am here today to visit about the Minam River Acquisition.

The Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation (RMEF) and ODFW have been working on an exciting land acquisition opportunity in Northeast Oregon. The project will acquire 15,573 acres of critical fish and wildlife habitat and establish the Minam River State Wildlife Area to be managed by ODFW. If approved by the Oregon Fish and Wildlife Commission, the first phase of the acquisition will close in late 2021.

OR FNAWS strongly supports the purchase of these 15,573 acres to make the Minam River State Wildlife area. This acquisition will link wildlife habitat from the Wallowa-Whitman National Forest (WWNF) to the Minam State Recreation Area. This acquisition will assure permanent protection of crucial habitat along a migration corridor for bighorn sheep, elk, mule deer, and other wildlife and will conserve approximately 160 miles of streams, including a significant stretch of the Minam River.

Acquisition of this property will secure public recreational access, improve access to adjacent National Forest (USFS) and Bureau of Land Management (BLM) lands. Multiple recreational interests will have access to a remote, rugged, amazing landscape.

Our understanding is the current Department budget does not include spending limitation for this acquisition; we request that this committee ensure that there is adequate limitation in the Department's budget to ensure that this acquisition is possible in the 21-23 biennium.

I want to thank the committee and legislators for their work on HB 5009. I look forward to the Minam River State Wildlife Area providing habitat for fish and wildlife, and recreation opportunities for the citizens of Oregon for many years.

Thank you for the opportunity to voice our support for ODFW's budget and the Minam River Acquisition.
